PhD Success for Oana Ivan

Supervisors Raj Puri and Glenn Bowman travelled to Babes Boylai University, Cluj-Napoca, Romania to examine Oana on Friday 11th January 2013.

Raj and Glenn joined examiners and supervisors from BBU in the first EU cotutelle doctorate at Kent. Under this scheme Oana was supervised by both universities while conducting research in Romania, and will receive a PhD from the Dept of Sociology and Social Work at BBU and a PhD from SAC

at Kent. Oana's thesis, *Cultural change in a fishing village in the Danube Delta: the consequences of environmental protection and tourism*, has already attracted the attention of the Global Environmental Facility at the World Bank, and she is beginning work for them reviewing the impacts of environmental regulations on the famous Danube Delta Biosphere Reserve. She also has two publications submitted to journals and is planning more in the future.



Prestigious Award for SAC student

Huge congratulations go to Samia Saif, Biodiversity Management, on winning the Future for Nature Award.

The award recognises the work that Samia has done on the protection of tigers in Bangladesh. The prize fund of

50,000 Euros can be used towards a conservation project of her choice and will be presented to Samia at a ceremony in the Netherlands in February.


The award will be presented by Dr Jane Goodall and Saba Douglas-Hamilton.
